
PROVINCIAL'S MESSAGE

Evangelii gaudium

The Gospel's joy fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. (Evangelii Gaudium)

Pope Francis consistently encourages priests and religious to embody joy. Living in joy isn't merely an emotional high; it's understanding divine love and experiencing God's love in our hearts and actions. This spiritual joy compels us to influence those around us to deepen their relationship with God, to know His Son Jesus, and to desire a connection with Him. When we cultivate this relationship with Jesus Christ, others will witness it and yearn to have Christ in their lives. It's an honour for us to gather and celebrate the Eucharist each day. During this ritual, we renew our joy in Christ as our victory and Saviour. In the Eucharist, we unite our lives with God and with His people as we celebrate the joy of the life we share together. As missionaries, it's a time for renewing our covenant with one another and our commitment to building God's Kingdom. (B. Fischer, C.PP.S.)

How do you celebrate joy in your lives? During the Easter season, Jesus appears to his apostles and says, *Peace* be with you. Peace is what Jesus imparts throughout his life to his apostles and the people when he healed, forgave, fed, welcomed, and listened. As Jesus greets his friends with "peace be with you," he reassures his presence, signifying that he is alive and walks with them. For us, Jesus is our peace. As we embrace His peace in our hearts, God will uplift us and inspire us to share it with each other. In our ministry, we are to embody His presence to those who seek guidance. Gaspar writes, *Interior peace comes* from God, have no doubt about it. God indeed wishes us to have it... all in all. its basis lies in the divine grace in our hearts. Thus, we keep advancing in it



with gentleness and trust. God is a God of peace. (Letter 1777)

How do you impart the peace of Christ to others? The Resurrection of Jesus Christ did more than abolish sin and death; it restored hope. Hope in the person of Jesus as truly the way, truth, and life. That Jesus is indeed the Messiah, and he awaits us in heaven. This is hope. As missionaries, whether on the streets or in our homes, we are called to renew our spirits with joy. peace, and hope. To preach with joy, guide those in our care or brothers in community with peace, and live with hope. It's a privilege for us as missionaries to share and bear witness to these qualities of the Christian faith. Once again, Gaspar speaks of hope, In prayer, make room for hope. Yes, let us place our hope in the merits of the

Precious Blood, a most efficacious devotion, in order to wipe out every hardened sinner. (Letter 2102)

Reflection

In the Eucharistic Prayer for Reconciliation II, there is a beautiful invocation where we pray that the People of God, the Church, becomes a sign of unity and an instrument of your peace. This prayer finds a profound resonance, particularly on Fridays and Fridays of the Lenten season. These days prompt deeper reflection on how each of us can contribute to fostering a world of peace, understanding, and harmony within our community houses.

How can one personally become a source or liaison of unity? This question beckons us to consider the profound impact of even the simplest acts of kindness, motivated purely by love. Whether it involves exercising patience with someone who challenges us, lending a compassionate ear to another's worries, or earnestly striving to understand those who may be difficult, each instance becomes a tangible demonstration of God's presence alive within us. In this, we heed our Lord's call to bridge divides and foster unity among all.

Undoubtedly, this endeavour is easier said than done. Yet, let us not forget that through our Baptism, God has united us as brothers in Christ. Our Lord continuously nourishes and challenges our spirits towards unity. It's a journey we embark upon each time we gather for the Eucharist, where we fervently pray for this very intention. In this sacred act of communion, we receive not only the sustenance of the bread of life and the cup of salvation but also the grace and clarity to become instruments of His peace.

May our encounters at the Eucharistic table and our daily communion with God through personal prayer

empower us to see one another through the eyes of God. Let us strive to live as one, transcending barriers and divisions, and embodying the unity and peace that our Lord envisions for His people. Let us pray earnestly for the strength and resolve to labor for unity and peace, rejecting the temptation to sow seeds of division.

Life at Merlini Mission House brings with it a mix of emotions. Returning to this familiar setting triggers some apprehension, despite my cherished memories of residing here for 11 years in the past. This time around, I find myself among retired members. Yet, any preconceived notions about older individuals being rigid, close-minded, or irritable have swiftly been dispelled.

One of the residents exudes laughter and warmth. He regales us with captivating stories from his assignments and travels, astonishing us with his sharp recollection of people and places despite his age. Sitting with Fr. B (Fr. Brendan) is an invitation to savour a cup of coffee and immerse oneself in his tales, leaving us both entertained and spiritually enriched.

Another member serves as our community's historian. With a deep passion for preserving our communal legacy, he meticulously recounts the history of our order, both on a global scale and within our Province.

His tenure as a missionary has endowed him with an encyclopedic knowledge of past events and figures, occasionally prompting me to wonder if he once walked alongside St. Gaspar. Over breakfast and during afternoon coffee breaks, **Fr. Peter** generously imparts lessons in Latin, adding an enriching dimension to our daily routines.

At Merlini Mission House, the ethos of hospitality reigns supreme. The opendoor policy welcomes unexpected members or visitors who seek solace, camaraderie, moments to vent or simply a friendly chat. I am continually impressed by how our residents embrace these moments, offering their presence and attention to those who cross our threshold, whether the conversation is lighthearted or profound.

In brief...

APRIL 29 AND 30: Fr. Lui attended the 103rd Toronto Diocesan CWL Convention in Ajax, Ontario. A gathering of five hundred dedicated faith-filled women who are truly remarkable and life -giving witnesses of Catholic faith. They were given a booth/table to promote and bring awareness of Venerable John Merlini Girls High School, in Dodoma, Tanzania. As the women stopped by, they filled out ballots to win prizes. The first prize was a Picnic Knapsack; second prize, a Travel Handbag; and the third prize, a Danier Leather Organizer. The two-day event ended with the Eucharist and a formal dinner with Archbishop Francis Leo as honoured guest and speaker.

OREMUS

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus repeatedly emphasizes the importance of prayer to his disciples. He exemplifies this by frequently withdrawing to secluded places — whether quiet corners, desert spaces, or mountain heights — to commune with his heavenly Father away from the clamour of crowds. In these moments, he listens attentively for the voice of God, finding strength and guidance.

Jesus's practice of seeking solitude to hear his Father's voice illustrates the peace and resilience that prayer brings, especially amid life's trials. Stepping away from the hustle of daily routines allows us to seek divine direction. By quieting our hearts and minds, we open ourselves to discerning God's plan for us. Regular periods of stillness enable us to attune to God's voice more clearly, deepening our understanding of His spirit and we come to know ourselves.

Prayer entails being present with God, listening to His voice, and experiencing His love, which in turn influences our decisions and actions. It instills courage, confidence, and a profound sense of companionship throughout life's journey. As Jesus reassures, *Be not afraid... I will be with you.*

Through prayer, we gain divine and realistic perspective on daily challenges. While it doesn't eliminate our problems, faithful prayer empowers us to confront them boldly, allowing God's goodness to radiate through us as faithful followers of Christ.

In the words of our founder, St. Gaspar, Everything is brought to maturity through prayer... let us give thanks to God in the meantime and let us continue to pray, for prayer will bring forth the perfect cure. (Letter 2987). In our prayers, do we listen attentively, or merely ask? Do we earnestly seek truth, even if it means embracing the challenges of understanding?

Requiescat in pace Reverend James Martin Reposkey CPPS



Reverend James Martin Reposkey, C.PP.S., who devoted an astounding 50 years to his service as Missionary of the Most Precious Blood, Atlantic Province, passed away peacefully, on April 9, 2024, in Celina, Ohio, USA.

Fr. Jim was born on July 16, 1946, in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, as the youngest of two sons to Louis Reposkey and Julia Reposkey (née Calabrese).

He attended St. Francis Minor Seminary in Greensburg for his philosophical studies and later pursued theological studies at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester, New York.

Following his ordination on May 4, 1974, Fr. Jim served as Associate Pastor at St. Roch's Church, Toronto, and later became its Pastor. In 1992, he was assigned to St. Alphonsus Church, Toronto, where he served as Pastor. His final assignment as Pastor, in 2016, was at St. Charles Borromeo Church, Toronto.

Fr. Jim was known for his compassionate heart and inability to refuse anyone in need. He served as a spiritual advisor for the Catholic Women's League in the Central Toronto Region for many years, held memberships in the Knights of the Holy Sepulchre and the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, Council 1388. He took immense pride in wearing the religious habit and missionary cross.

Fr. Jim's Funeral Mass was celebrated at St. Charles Borromeo Church and he was laid to rest at Westminster Cemetery, in Toronto.

St. Gaspar del Bufalo to renew the Church through the ministry of the Word and the proclamation of our salvation in Christ's Precious Blood.


Continue to call men to share in that mission as priests and brothers who respond to the cry of the blood in our world today.
