

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ROOTED IN CHRIST, SENT IN HOPE

Pope St. John Paul II, in his 1990 encyclical *The Mission of the Redeemer*, emphasized the missionary dimension of the Church, affirming that every missionary is called to live with authentic missionary zeal. This zeal gives meaning to our pastoral care, our prayer, and our personal sacrifices.

St. Gaspar longed to leave Rome for foreign lands, but through the guidance of his spiritual director and Pope Pius VII, he came to understand that Rome itself was his “mission land.” With this conviction, he set out to preach and evangelize throughout the Papal States with unwavering fervour. Proclaiming the Gospel gives hope, for it animates the Church’s mission, our ministry, our fraternity, and our spirituality. Blood of Christ—Hope for the world.

The life of St. Paul teaches us two important lessons. First, we must be firmly rooted in a personal encounter with Jesus Christ. Such a conviction naturally overflows into our communities and into every relationship we form. Second, just as St. Paul placed himself at the service of others, we too discover a deeper courage to speak the truth and to serve generously. This sense of purpose gives rise to missionary hopefulness and zeal.

How do we keep this zeal alive amid the many tasks entrusted to us?

First, on a personal level, we must remain attentive to our ongoing curiosity while also deepening our understanding of our tradition and appreciating why we live it.

Second, we must care for our mental health; we are human beings, and we have only one Messiah.

Third, it is essential to cultivate meaningful relationships with priests and religious—both within and beyond our community—as well as with lay people, so that we may share our joys and sorrows.

Fourth, ongoing education is vital, for it forms both the human mind and the spirit.

Finally, we are called to preach and to work for peace and justice. In doing so, we live according to the Spirit of Jesus and give glory to God the Father.

Let us live our missionary zeal with passion.





CHAPLET OF THE PRECIOUS BLOOD OF CHRIST

SECOND MYSTERY: AGONY IN THE GARDEN

The Agony of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane stands as one of the most profound and heart-rending moments in the events leading up to the Passion of our Lord. It offers to us a unique window into the mystery of Christ's dual nature—being fully God and fully Man—as well as revealing the depth of Jesus' redemptive mission on earth. By reflecting on the Agony in the Garden, we're invited into a more profound understanding of the value and meaning of suffering, the discernment required by obedience to faith, and the transformative power of prayer to submit ourselves to the Will of God.

In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus experiences intense anguish, described in the Gospels as a sorrow “even to the point of death.” (Mt 26:38) Luke further notes, “And His sweat became like great drops of blood falling down to the ground.” (Lk 22:44b) This agony is not a sign of weakness but a testament to the true humanity of Christ. Like every human being, Jesus is not immune from fear, pain, or the instinct for self-preservation. His Precious Blood, falling like sweat, reveals the extent to which Jesus is willing to embrace suffering and death for our sins. By facing the real likelihood of his impending fate, Jesus enters fully into the human condition, embracing it in all its vulnerability. This is Jesus’ solidarity with humankind: God becomes man, not in some theoretical or

spiritual sense, but in the very real experience of human suffering and the limits of human existence.

The agony in the garden also reveals Christ's divinity. His prayer—"Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not as I will, but as you will" (Mt 26:39)—expresses both a deep and personal Father-Son relationship, as well as a humble submission to His Father's divine plan for humanity. In this tension between human fear and divine obedience, the Church sees the mystery of Christ divine and human wills united, but also distinct.

The agony in the garden is not merely about facing physical pain then, as it is also about Jesus' willingness to bear the spiritual weight of the world's sins while also struggling with accepting His Father's will.

The agony in the garden is also a prelude to Christ's redemptive sacrifice on the Cross. In the garden, Jesus freely accepts the "cup" of suffering, as a part of His Father's will. This act of obedience un-does the disobedience of Adam. Whereas the first Adam faltered in a garden, seeking his own will over God's, the "new Adam," by contrast, triumphs in the garden of Gethsemane by surrendering Himself completely to the Father's plan for Him and for humanity.

Christ's agony in the garden ultimately unveils the depth of Christ's love, for He chooses to embrace the Cross out of love for each person. This "suffering with" (aka, compassion) is not abstract; it's personal and particular. It leads to our redemption and salvation.

HOW TO LIVE OUT THIS MYSTERY

Think of your garden of Gethsemane. Where do you seek to be alone with God outside of

Church? Take some time to go there this week and be honest with God about your vocation and its struggles. Pray for discernment.

Take a walk in the crisp morning air. While walking, ask God to give you an insight into some person who is struggling in life and how you might help ease their burden.

Think about how your own blood brings you life and energy to overcome life's difficulties. Pray for someone who is sick or lonely or on the margins and visit them this week, so that they will know that they are not alone.

MINUTES OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL MEETING: January 12, 2026

The Provincial Council met by Zoom on January 12 at 1:00pm. All members of the Council were present: Frs. Santi, D'Angelo, Cafarelli, Doherty. Fr. Colacino recorded the minutes.

OPENING PRAYER Fr. John led the opening prayer on the memorial of Blessed Giovanni Merlini.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES Meetings of October 21 and June 27.

► A clarification was offered regarding the Rochester mission house having its status changed to a residence by the provincial assembly. It remains open as such after Fr. John decided not to move to the Friendly Home.

► Both minutes were approved unanimously after a motion by Fr. Mario, seconded by Fr. Sam.

REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL TREASURER

► Fr. Peter reported that the Bathurst property has still not been sold. A serious offer fell through because the prospective buyer wished to delay closing by a full year. The realtor will list the property at the end of February or early March, as the current market conditions are not favourable. We will be satisfied with the lower end of the estimated value of the property. Our partners are not prepared to buy us out.

► As for provincial finances, we closed the year in a stronger position than the previous one, with approximately Can\$45,000 in savings. Overall, the accounts remain healthy, even though fewer members are working and generating income. Expenses have also been lower than in past years.

VOCATION/FORMATION REPORT A report on Joseph Kibuule's visit to St. Alphonsus and an update to inquirers.

MODERATOR GENERAL In a recent conversation with the Moderator General, Fr. Lupi noted that he is less concerned about the size of a province than about its fidelity to our charism and its financial viability. Other provinces are smaller than our own, and our normative texts do not mandate a minimum number of members for a province.

FOLLOW-UP TO PREVIOUS COUNCIL MEETING

A discussion regarding the Development Office's consideration of hiring a lay director noted that such a move would be costly, and maintaining the current arrangement appears to be the most prudent option. Nonetheless, the Council should retain a measure of oversight.

VISIT TO FRANK CARDINAL LEO The Provincial met with Cardinal Leo, who expressed his satisfaction with our ministry in the archdiocese.
